

Zachary D. Kaufman is an Adjunct Professor of Law at the University of Puerto Rico Law School while he is completing his Doctor of Philosophy degree in International Relations at the University of Oxford. He will soon join the international law firm of O'Melveny & Myers.



Mr. Kaufman's professional experience has focused on the investigation, apprehension, and prosecution of suspected perpetrators of atrocities, including genocide, war crimes, crimes against humanity, and terrorism. He has worked at the United States Court of Appeals for the First Circuit; the United States Departments of Justice and State; the United Nations International Criminal Tribunals for Rwanda and for the Former Yugoslavia; the International Criminal Court; Stanford University's Center on Democracy, Development, and the Rule of Law; O'Melveny & Myers; and Google's Global Public Policy and Government Affairs department. Mr. Kaufman is also working to build Rwanda's first-ever public library, the Kigali Public Library.

Mr. Kaufman focuses his research, writing, and teaching on International Law, particularly International Criminal Law and Transitional Justice. His first book, *After Genocide: Transitional Justice, Post-Conflict Reconstruction, and Reconciliation in Rwanda and Beyond*, which he co-edited with Dr. Phil Clark, was co-published by Columbia University Press and C. Hurst & Co. in 2009.

Mr. Kaufman holds a Juris Doctor degree from Yale Law School, where he served as Editor-in-Chief of the *Yale Law & Policy Review*. He also holds a Master of Philosophy in International Relations from Oxford University, where he was a Marshall Scholar, and a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from Yale University.
